## EAGLES AUTISM CHALLENGE

Our signature fundraising event, presented by Lincoln Financial Group, celebrated a milestone year as we hosted the fifth Eagles Autism Challenge in May of 2022. Eagles Autism Challenge offered participants the option to choose from three cycling routes (Wawa Junior 10-Mile Ride, Wawa Shorti 30-Mile Ride, Wawa Classic 50-Mile Ride), in addition to the FreedomPay 5K Run/Walk and a family-friendly FreedomPay Sensory Walk. All five routes began at the cross section of 1 Lincoln Financial Field Way and Pattison Avenue and took participants on a scenic journey around the City of Philadelphia and its suburbs. Participants returned to Lincoln Financial Field and crossed the finish line at the 50-yard line where an on-field celebration and awards ceremony awaited. Supporters who wanted to fundraise but were unable to ride, run, or walk in person had the option to register as a virtual participant. The day was filled with enthusiasm, fun, and hope for the future as we come together to change lives!

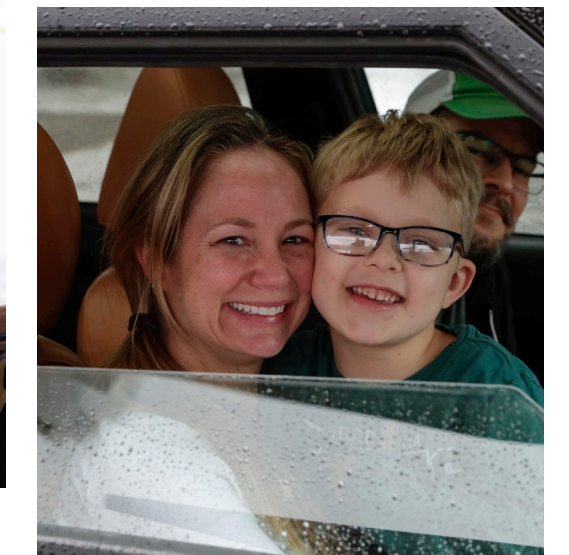

## HUDDLE UP FOR AUTISM DRIVE THROUGH EVENT

OVER \$637,440 RAISED SINCE 2009

For the second year, Huddle Up for Autism was reimagined and brought to life as a drive-thru event so families could enjoy a sensory friendly event together in a safe, socially distance manner. Hundreds of cars, some of which were decorated in Eagles green, lined up at Lincoln Financial Field for an event specifically created for our autism community. The sensory-friendly drive-thru was a one-of-a-kind experience benefiting the Center for Autism Research (CAR) at Children's Hospital of Philadelphia. With families primarily enjoying activities from the comfort of their own vehicles, the day featured a visually interactive route that included appearances by Elmwood Park Zoo, Philadelphia Party Princesses, Philadelphia Fire Department, Mural Arts Program, SWOOP, Eagles Cheerleaders, Eagles players and more. It is so important to celebrate these families and provide this special event that not just creates engagement in the community, but also raises money for CAR.





## GOLF OUTING

OVER \$400,000 RAISED

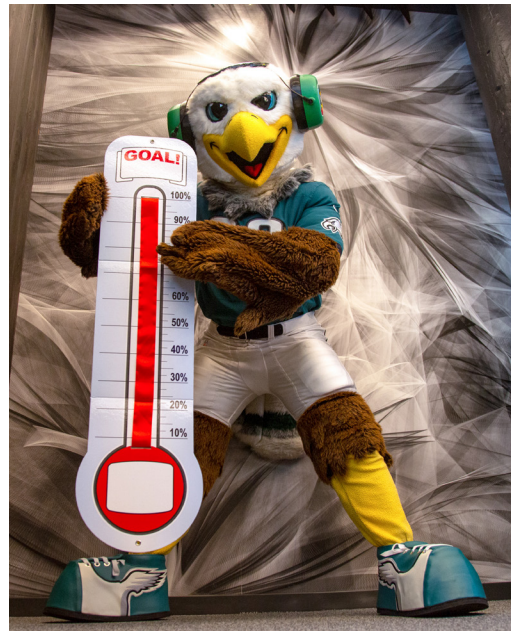

## 50/50 program

\$1,045,267 RAISED

The 2022 season was record breaking in many ways. One of the most impactful records was our 50/50 raffle.

Each Eagles home game, one lucky fan walked away a winner of half of the Eagles Autism Foundation 50/50 Raffle, with the other half supporting EAF. The jackpot reached a record amount of \$388,500 for the NFC Championship Game.

This season a new element was added – an exclusive pin collection. Fans received a pin with every \$25 50/50 raffle ticket purchase. Before every home game, Eagles players would unveil the pins that would be featured at that upcoming game. Each raffle seller only has one design, so fans needed to try and collect them all.

## STOUTLAND UNIVERSITY SHIRT OVER \$100,000 RAISED

It started with Jordan Mailata saying, "Jeff Stoutland University" in place of a college for introductions on Sunday Night Football, (in honor of the Eagles offensive line coach and run game coordinator). In his tenth year in Philadelphia, Jeff Stoutland is currently the longest-tenured member of the Eagles' coaching staff. His daughter, Madison Lee, a brand strategist and designer, was inspired to sell with her father to create a Stoutland University t-shirt to sell in support of the Eagles Autism Foundation. "We love the Eagles. It was an easy choice for us to do it with Eagles Autism Foundation, because we love volunteering and doing whatever we can to help out," Madi said. EAF is a family affair for the Stoutlands, with Jeff's wife Allison being a long-time volunteer at EAF events including Radiothon, Public Practice Yard Sale and Eagles Autism Challenge. Coach Stoutland welcomed the opportunity for collaboration with his daughter for a cause close to their hearts. "It was actually really cool for her and me to work together. We sat down, she asked me questions, and then I'd tell her what I think it should look like, and then she comes up with it," he said. "She's tremendously talented, so I just let her run with it." More than 5,000 shirts were ordered, available in green or black, featuring Jeff's signature saying, 'Hungry Dogs Run Faster', along with 1984 which is his inaugural coaching year.

## THE TALLEY FAMILY

When Lauren and Brent Talley's two-year old daughter Olivia was diagnosed as being on the autism spectrum, they didn't really know too much about it. Lauren had heard that no two children on the spectrum are alike and immediately went into research mode, finding what was the best course of action for her daughter. Feeling lucky to be able to get into CHOP for services and evaluation and identifying the proper program for Olivia, they then spent an agonizing nine months on the waiting list. Eventually Lauren's persistence of calling their preferred program nearly weekly paid off. Following therapy, they could see a positive shift in Olivia, with her true self shining through.

Lauren's family have been Eagles season ticket holders her entire life. Lauren and Brent were at the 2021 home opener with Lauren's dad and brother when they noticed a promotion for the Eagles Autism Foundation. Lauren's brother suggested that they create a team for Olivia, opening the door to learning more about EAF. Their own experience created a deep connection with the dire need of funding for additional programs. It can be difficult to talk with people who don't live it themselves and Lauren feels that moving from awareness to action and EAF's mission statement is "basically our life", providing a comforting connection to others with similar lives.

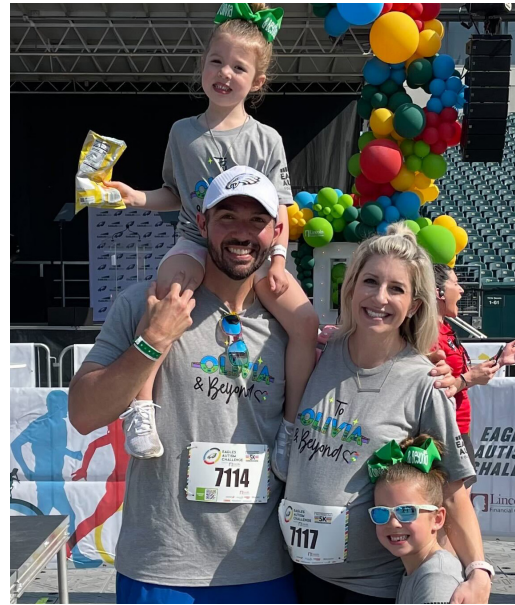
As first-time participants in the Eagles Autism Challenge in May 2022, the Talley and Jacono family, in addition to Olivia, 6-year-old Reynolds and baby Jordan, tackled the community with different fundraising experiences. The girls' school, St. Thomas the Apostle in Glen Mills, allowed students, teachers and staff to dress in Eagles gear and enjoy a visit from the Eagles mascot, SWOOP. Olivia held SWOOP's hand as she escorted him throughout the classrooms where children of all ages asked questions, such as learning why SWOOP was wearing headphones. For Autism Awareness Month this year, their school held a "Autism Awareness" t-shirt fundraiser where students and staff purchased team To Olivia & Beyond t-shirts and wore them throughout the month of April!

In April, the Talley family hosted a Dine & Donate

Spirit Day at the Chik-fil-A in Concordville, PA. Afterwards, the manager admitted that she had greatly underestimated what this first-time event was capable of. It ended up being one of the largest fundraisers that location had seen in a very long time. They needed to call in extra staff and drive-through lines wrapped around the building, with an estimation that one in every 3 or 4 cars was there for the fundraiser. This was with promotion being limited to word-of-mouth and social media; nothing onsite! In another instance of bringing awareness and action, at the end of the day, the Talley family got to meet the store operator who told them it turned into so much more than their typical fundraiser and provided an opportunity to educate the staff on autism. Their team has since hosted similar (and just as successful) fundraising events in December 2022 (Cupcake Sisters) and February 2023 at P.J. Whelihan's Restaurant + Pub in West Chester as a Dine & Donate/ Eagles Trivia Night with The Quizzo Guys! Eagles Mascot SWOOP and several Eagles Cheerleaders joined them.

As is the case for so many families, it is never a straight line of progression. In summer of 2022, the facility where Olivia was receiving therapy closed, which was devastating. The search and waiting started all over again, although this time with more of a support network through EAF and luckily not as long. Olivia started at a new facility in the Fall of 2022.

Following the Dine & Donate fundraisers, Lauren continues to receive social media messages from mothers, whom she does not know, with the outpouring gratitude of being so open and vulnerable in sharing Olivia's story and bringing light and emotional support. "That's why you make the extra effort to bring awareness", Lauren says. "The more people who are aware of different triggers and what makes our children who they are, the greater understanding and acceptance. All we can do as parents is do our part to create a world that is aware and accepting.

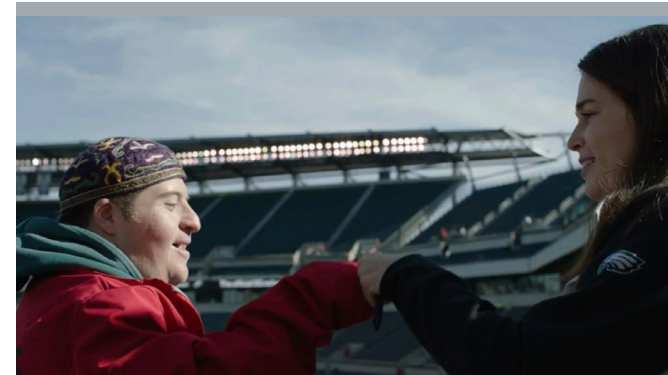


## INCLUSION AT LINCOLN FINANCIAL FIELD GAMEDAY STAFF

Tackling one of the greatest challenges of the autism community, employment, has been the force behind a growing neurodiverse employment program.

Matching skills and abilities with the most appropriate gameday role, the number of neurodiverse gameday staff quadrupled this season, with a variety of postings throughout the stadium. Eagles Autism Foundation Board Certified Behavior Analyst (BCBA) and Director of Scientific Programs and Inclusion Initiatives, Kirsten Saraceni, continues to serve as a resource for both the staff and the supervisors. Starting with orientation, Kirsten

provides a schedule for what one can expect during that event and then for each game, reviewing all aspects of each unique role. She checks in throughout the game to answer any questions that may arise. Information about the Eagles Autism Foundation is included with all job applications and is part of orientation to make every employee aware of the program, to utilize the available resources and/or support the cause. Outside of the events at Lincoln Financial Field the EAF employment initiative has also supported the fulfillment of Stoutland University shirts and merchandise sales.

## SENSORY ROOM

The sensory room at Lincoln Financial Field intends to create memorable moments for dedicated and passionate fans. A family with an individual on the autism spectrum may struggle at NFL stadiums that have a no-re-entry rule. Our sensory room, which a change to trained staff member oversees, allows those individuals to take a break in this quiet space, where in other situations the family would have no other option but to leave the event. The sensory room, visual schedule, and sensory bags allow for families to plan ahead for events at Lincoln Financial Field. This sense of comfort for a family with a child on the autism spectrum is truly priceless!



## MY CAUSE MY CLEATS

The whole organization participates, from Jeffrey Lurie and Head Coach Nick Sirianni to football and support staff. This year, 10 players represented the Eagles Autism Foundation on the field with their cleats.

## SUPER BOWL SURPRISE

Each year, the Eagles have the opportunity to surprise a special fan with tickets to the Super Bowl. This year's recipient epitomizes what EAF is all about. Ryan Lloyd's enthusiasm is evident to anyone who is fortunate to interact with him. While attending St. Joseph University, where he was part of their ASPIRE program, he received the 6th Man of the Year Award for his support of the sports teams – cheering at events across the campus. During his senior year of college, Ryan joined the Eagles Autism Foundation. Upon graduation, like many adults with autism, Ryan struggled to find meaningful employment. At a rally for the first Eagles Autism Challenge, Ryan was encouraged by the Kinney Center for Autism Education and Support at St. Joseph University to learn more about CAI's Neurodiverse Solutions Program. CAI Neurodiverse Solutions employment program helps connect neurodiverse individuals with employment opportunities. That led to him attending CAI's training program an hour and half away from his New Jersey home in Allentown. With the distance, his grandmother and mother needed to go along to drive him. Following the five-day training, Ryan was offered a job that matched his qualifications and skill set, as a quality assurance analyst working for a major pharmaceutical company client. He now lives independently in Philadelphia and can be seen at numerous EAF events. When he received his surprise, Ryan said that when he was little his dad always said if the Eagles made it to the Super Bowl, he would take him. Calling it "the circle of life", Ryan now gets to take his dad to the Super Bowl.

## VALLEY FORGE EDUCATIONAL SERVICES

For Eagles Autism Foundation, it goes far beyond raising critical funding. We are always looking for opportunities to extend our reach and engage with the autism community in ways that meet their needs and further connect them to our team.

"Having the opportunity to partner with the Eagles Autism Foundation made this the most exciting and purposeful challenge," said Sydney Shirlow, West Chester University's EAF College Program President. "The opportunity to volunteer at events such as the Huddle Up for Autism, Eagles Autism Challenge, and home games gave us priceless experiences that we would not have had otherwise. We appreciate all of the guidance and support given to us from the Eagles Autism Foundation." New-to-the-program this year, Goldey-Beacom College has helped to raise thousands of dollars on gameday through merchandise sales, as well as have served as the face of the foundation for fans at the game. This program allows for merchandise to be sold at all home games, heightening brand awareness and funds for the foundation.

## 2022 SCIENTIFIC REVIEW AND FUNDING

In 2022, Eagles Autism foundation contributed \$4.1 million to fund nine pilot studies and two post-doctoral fellowships. A total of 41 letters of intent were submitted for research grant funding. Each project was carefully reviewed by an independent team of 17 scientists who have demonstrated a steadfast commitment to autism research, services and programs, along with lead scientific advisor, Dr. Emanuel DiCicco-Bloom. Areas of basic, population, and clinical research and programs that are designed to elucidate the etiology, diagnosis, treatment, and prevention of autism were reviewed. Boston's Children's Hospital (BCH), Children's Hospital of Philadelphia (CHOP), Cleveland Clinic- Lerner Research Institute, Hebrew University of Jerusalem, University of Iowa, and University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill received funding for their research which spans the range of building on current ongoing and effective programs to topics and approaches that were novel, exploratory, and innovative.

In an effort to attract researchers to specialize in the field of autism, two post-doctoral fellowship awards were funded for young investigators to continue their work under the mentorship of experienced scientists at Children's Hospital of Philadelphia and Drexel University.

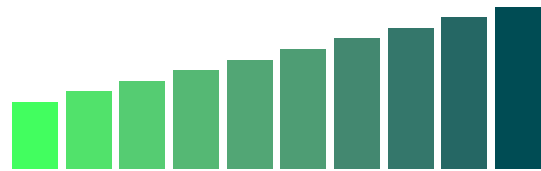
